

NDDAC Releases COVID-19 Standard of Care Statements

The North Dakota Disabilities Advocacy Consortium has released two separate sets of communications to state leaders advancing the adoption and implementation of standards of care to be provided to individuals with disabilities during this current COVID-19 public health emergency. The NDDAC encourages all agencies and professionals to apply and the public to understand these standards of care during this current emergency and into the future as we reenter more normal times.

Standard of Care Recommendations

On April 2, 2020, the North Dakota Disabilities Advocacy Consortium released a statement specifying a series of recommendations which advance standards of care provided to individuals with disabilities during the current COVID-19 public health emergency. This statement, addressed to Governor Doug Burgum, Mylynn Tufte, ND State Health Officer, and Christopher Jones, Executive Director of the ND Department of Human Services, requests that these standard of care recommendations be adopted and implemented by all state's agencies and disseminated to the state's public and private medical and human service providers.
